On existing maps, naming is not standardised: Deschênes Forest, Gillot Park, Riverain Park, Deschênes Rapids Park, Lamoureux Marsh and others

Deschênes Park - points of interest



- A. Red oak forest « Deschênes Forest »
- mature red oak forest, present for at least a century an uncommon forest type in Gatineau
- protected from development by the City Council in 2020

B. Wetlands complex

- · large permanent marshes in centre, bordered by seasonal marshes
- abundant turtles, aquatic birds, mammals

C. Rocky barrens

• a rare ecosystem in Québec - open, dry habitats host rare plants and are essential for some species of birds, frogs and snakes

D. Riparian (riverside) zone

• many micro-habitats and rare plants

E. Hickory Point

population of shagbark hickory trees, rare in Québec, typical of areas further south

F. Wood duck marsh

- seasonal marsh, a complex habitat with high species diversity
- easily observed from the wooden pedestrian bridge

G. Archeological site at the head of the old portage

- public archeological dig in 2013
- numerous artefacts of historical and pre-historical eras found
- · witness to the importance of the Deschênes portage site through history

H. Conroy Island

nesting site for five species of aquatic birds

I. Deschênes Rapids

- one of the few undeveloped rapids on the Ottawa River
- site of significant industrial installations early 1800s to 1930
- small population of white oaks, rare in Québec

« Voyageurs » recreational pathway

- the pathway traverses the park from west to east, near the oak forest and wetlands in the western part of the park, along the river in the eastern part
- active transport link to Gatineau's city centre, Champlain bridge and old Aylmer
- very popular with residents and visitors throughout the year
